The Boulder County Fair's mission is to celebrate both rural and urban heritage while cultivating an innovative future through education and leadership. With a tradition of showcasing the accomplishments and leadership of both 4-H and FFA youth and community members, we provide educational and entertaining opportunities for all attendees, meeting the interests and challenges of a changing world.

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GENERAL INFORMATION AND RULES

Cooperation – The Boulder County Fair Livestock Show and Rodeo is held in cooperation with the Boulder County Board of Commissioners, the Boulder County Fair Board and the Boulder County Office of Colorado State University Extension. The Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show and Rodeo does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, age, disability, sexual preference, veteran or marital status, or national origin in its policies and activities.

Responsibility - The Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF) Management will use all possible care to ensure the safety of animals, exhibits, exhibitors, and people attending the fair. The BCF Management or any individual assisting with the fair, will in no case be responsible for any loss or damage done to, occasioned by, or arising from any animal, or article on exhibition, or for any accident or injury to any person exhibiting, assisting with, or attending the fair. The exhibitors shall indemnify the Fair Management against all legal or other proceeding in regard hereto. The placing of any exhibits on the show grounds by any and all exhibitors shall signify his/her agreement to abide by this rule.

FAIRGROUND RULES

1. Alcohol/Drug Restrictions – Pursuant to Colorado Statue 12-47-901(1)(h)(l), it is illegal to bring **any** outside alcoholic beverages into the BCF, including parking lots. Alcoholic beverages not purchased on the premises will be confiscated immediately and may result in fines and/or ejection from the premises. The presence or use of alcoholic beverages on the fairgrounds is prohibited except in designated areas.

Illegal drugs of any kind, including marijuana, are prohibited from the BCF, including parking lots. Any illegal drugs, including marijuana, will be confiscated and may result in fines and/or ejection from the premises.

2. Disorderly Conduct, Illegal Activity, Vandalism & Horseplay will not be tolerated. Violators will be escorted from the fairgrounds by security and may be prosecuted. No person shall engage in foul, obscene or abusive language or actions.

3. Motorized Vehicles - ATV's and golf carts will not be permitted without prior written permission from the BCF Board. Use of carts is restricted in the areas of the midway or in pedestrian travel areas during BCF hours of operation.

4. Leash Law: Boulder County and the City of Longmont require all dogs to be on a leash at all times on public property. For the safety of animals and people, dogs are not allowed in the poultry, rabbit, goat, or sheep areas and the indoor arena during horse events.

5. Unauthorized carrying or discharging firearms or weapons of any kind is not permitted. Unauthorized paintball, BB, pellet, air, blowguns, rocket slingshots, crossbows, martial arts weapons, fireworks and explosives are not allowed during the Fair.

6. Smoking is not permitted in county facilities or on county property and therefore adhered to by BCF.

7. Parking is not permitted in assigned fire lanes or where otherwise posted "No Parking." Violators may be ticketed and/or towed at owner's expense.

8. Camping is permitted only at the campgrounds. Dry camping ("exhibitors/spectators camping outside the campgrounds") will only be allowed when the campground is full or when prior approval is obtained from the Fair Board.

EXHIBITOR GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

ENTRIES

1. Eligibility - Competition is open to all. 4-H and FFA Exhibitors must belong to a Boulder County 4-H or FFA Club.
2. Entries – Prior entry is required in all departments. Online entries only in 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions.

Entry deadline: Monday, July 27, 2020

DOG DEADLINE: August 3rd, 2020. (All videos and photos complete)

HORSE DEADLINE: August 3, 2020 (All videos and photos complete)

NO Late entries in 2020

JUDGING

1. Judges will not award prizes to an unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the department that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. This rule must be strictly adhered to whether there is competition or not. Exhibits that do not meet size requirements will not be considered for Champion or Reserve Champion.
2. Judges shall report to the superintendent any exhibitors who in any way, whether in person or by agents or servants, interfere with them during the adjudication or show any disrespect to them, whereupon **the superintendent shall at his/her discretion demand a proper apology from such exhibitor, or exclude exhibitors from further competition, and the board may withhold from such exhibitors any premiums that have been awarded them, and expel them from further exhibiting at the fair.**
3. The decision of the awarding judges shall be final, and no appeal will be considered.
4. Any exhibitor attempting to interfere with the judges during their adjudication will be promptly excluded from the competition.
5. In all cases not covered by these rules, the ruling of the superintendent of the department will apply.
6. The judge and superintendent of the department shall sign each award book immediately after all awards have been made in the class contained therein.
7. No person shall act as judge in any class in which he/she may be interested as a relative, agent, or employee of an exhibitor or otherwise; and if such case shall be presented, the superintendent of department may remove such interested judge, or substitute another judge temporarily.
8. The awards of such premiums at the show will be confined to entries named in the department.
9. The judge and the person acting as clerk to the judge must take special pains after making an award to see that it is properly entered in the award book.
10. The clerk at each show verifies the accuracy of the judge's book between pre-entries and actual entrants. The superintendent signs the book before premium money is awarded.

GRIEVANCES, PROTESTS AND APPEALS

1. An "appeal" may be filed by 4-H / FFA and open class exhibitors to get clarifications regarding rules, policies, and judging procedures. The Division Superintendent or the entity (example the Junior Livestock Sale Committee, Horse Leaders Council, Livestock Advisory) would be

responsible, as appropriate to handle all appeals;

2. If a protest is filed by 4-H / FFA members, open class exhibitor(s), or other individual(s); the following procedure will be followed. A "Protest Form" must be completed in writing and can be obtained at the Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF) Manager's Office. A fee of \$150.00 in cash or certified check must accompany the protest form. The protest shall plainly state the cause of the protest and shall be delivered to the Fair Manager's office prior to judging or within 1 (one) hour after the conclusion of the class judging. Judging will not be interrupted by a protest and judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation. Once the championship judging begins, no protest will be accepted. The protest committee made up of the division superintendent and two fair board representatives will meet and act upon the filed protest. A decision will be given to the individual filing the protest within 24 hours of receiving the filed protest unless a thorough investigation by the protest committee takes longer, in which case the individual filing the protest will be notified. The fee(s) imposed the protest;
3. In the event an individual is not satisfied with the protest ruling by the protest committee, the exhibitor may appeal the protest resolution to the Protest Appeals Committee. This committee is made up of the Fair Board Executive Committee. A fee of \$200.00 in cash or certified check must accompany the appeal which shall be in writing, on an "Appeal Form" obtained at the Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF) Management Office. The appeal shall plainly state the matter being appealed and shall be delivered to the Fair Management Office not more than 8 (eight) hours after the protest resolution was announced. The decision of the Protest Appeals Committee is final. Compliance with the protest and appeal process is mandatory prior to seeking review in any other forum. The fee(s) imposed above shall be refunded if the matter is resolved in favor of the person bringing the protest appeal;
4. In addition to the fee(s) imposed for the process, an individual protesting that the use of illegal drugs were administered to an animal and ask for testing be administered will stand the cost of the testing if no residuals are identified. Often such tests can cost over \$1,000.00 for each substance chemical checked. If illegal substances are found the cost of the test will be charged against the exhibitor along with the other consequences under general rules number two "Alteration of Conformation and Structure, Prohibited Substances or Unethical Fitting".

EXHIBIT RELEASE

1. ~~No exhibit shall be released until 5:00 p.m. Monday, August 10 except livestock.~~ All exhibits in the Exhibit Building must be picked up between 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. The Fair management won't be responsible for exhibits left after exhibit release. Removal of any exhibit before the designated time will cause the forfeiture of award money.
2. ~~Livestock No tack may be removed until the conclusion of the Livestock sale and in coordination with the Department Supervisor. Water, feed for the following day, and bedding is to stay in place for remaining livestock.~~
3. ~~Animals will be released only during each departments designated release time. See specific departments for the release time.~~ Livestock sold in the Jr. Market Livestock Sale and released by the Jr. Market Livestock Committee President are exempt. Birds sold in the Poultry Sale are exempt and will be released at the time of sale.
 - a. Release will be permitted by the Department Superintendent after review of stalls, pens, cages, and tie racks. These areas must be cleaned to the satisfaction of the superintendent and fairgrounds staff.
 - b. Failure to comply with this requirement may bar said exhibitor from future

participation and/or any premiums, which may have been awarded.

4-H/FFA JUNIOR EXHIBIT RULES

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY

1. Only members in good standing and actively enrolled in Boulder County 4-H, St. Vrain Valley FFA, or Boulder Valley FFA, and who have carried out and completed all required project work to date, are eligible to exhibit and show in 4-H/FFA Junior Fair classes.
2. Age Limits: To compete, 4-H members must have turned 8 before January 1st of the current year and be less than 19 as of January 1 of the current year. St. Vrain FFA members must follow FFA age requirement guidelines and follow all FFA requirements. To compete, FFA members must be eligible for and enrolled in St. Vrain Valley FFA during the school year ending in May of the current year, AND be less than 19 as of January 1 of the current year.
3. Cloverbud: Cloverbud 4-H members (ages 5–7) may exhibit in areas specifically created for them at the fair. They may be recognized for their participation, but not awarded placement ribbons or premiums. Cloverbuds may not participate in competitive events. All proposed exhibits for Cloverbud 4-H members must be approved by the Extension Office before they can be labeled for Cloverbud participation. Cloverbud members may not sell in the Junior Market Livestock Sale.

EXHIBIT ELIGIBILITY

1. Ownership. All Junior Livestock entries must be the property of, and be shown by, the eligible exhibitor. All animals shown must have been fed and cared for by the 4-H member or FFA student exhibiting in their regularly conducted project. Crops and gardens exhibits must have been taken from a field or garden grown by and the property of the exhibitor. Ownership of animals must be in the 4-H club member or FFA exhibitor's individual name prior to the Last Friday of April of the year exhibited, except for market projects which must be owned by market nomination for each species, and except the Lease-An-Animal exhibitors which have a signed lease contract in the Extension Office.

JUNIOR EXHIBITOR LIVESTOCK AND ANIMAL DIVISION RULES

“Livestock” – refers to the following species; beef, dairy, goat, poultry, rabbit, cavy, sheep, and swine.

ANIMAL TREATMENT

1. The Boulder County Fair, (BCF) is organized and operated exclusively for educational purposes, and sponsors, produces and presents exhibitions of livestock, livestock products and the like for children, adults, and the public. These exhibitions educate the livestock industry, participants of the BCF, general public in better breeding, feeding and care of livestock. BCF arranges for the judging and presentation of premiums and prizes, and the like, in continuation of such exhibitions and/or shows.
2. COLORADO REVISED STATUTES: All exhibitors further agree to abide by all the rules of the Colorado Revised Statutes in regard to livestock shows, exhibitions, and sales. In particular, Section 18-9-207 as it refers to the tampering, drugging, and misrepresentation of animals.
3. The Boulder County Fair and 4-H program adheres to the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) National Code of Show Ring Ethics. Each Livestock exhibitor indicates by turning in entries that they have read the code and will abide by these guidelines.

IAFE NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the “IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics”, fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- a. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- b. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- c. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- d. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the

animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates in the animals entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- e. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except the external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- f. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- g. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- h. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- i. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- j. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an

animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

- k. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

4. The superintendent of each department and the official animal rights spokesperson for the fair, if in agreement, have the authority to disqualify exhibitors for inhuman treatment of animals at the Boulder County Fair, Livestock Show & Rodeo (BCF).

5. Inhuman Treatment of Animals. Abuse of animal(s) in any form will not be allowed. No electric prods will be allowed to be used on any animal at any time. Any violation of this rule will result in immediate disqualification with no recourse.

6. Alteration of Conformation and Structure by Prohibited Substance or Unethical Fitting. Prohibited Substance and/or Unethical Fitting defined as: The injection of internal or external administration of any product or material, whether gas, solid, or liquid, to an animal for the purpose of enhancing or transforming the true conformation, configuration, color, breed, condition or age or by making the animal appear more sound than otherwise would appear; the administration, use or application of any drug or feed additive affecting the central nervous system; the administration of diuretics for cosmetic purposes, tissue manipulation, removal, surgical attachment or otherwise to change, conceal, enhance, or transform the true conformation or configuration of the animal; attaching to the hide foreign objects including hair or hair substitutes, cloth or fiber for the purpose of deception. Any physical or physiological attempt to alter the natural musculature or weight by use of injections or ingested material not conducive to the continued health or marketability of bovine, sheep, or swine carcasses or for deception. Violation of this rule will result in disqualification with no recourse and be subject to other sanctions; and the use of artificial tail head, tail fin, poll, use of hair or hair-like substance, cloth or fiber, ineligible age, illegal substitution of animal(s), violates these rules and will result in immediate disqualification with no recourse. Every participant in consideration of their entry being accepted by BCF specifically represents that no animal entered therein by the participant is misrepresented in any way, except for trimming feet or blocking of hair. Every participant agrees to submit the entry for any inspection deemed appropriate by BCF, and further specifically agrees that the conclusion reached by BCF as to whether such animal(s) is in violation of prohibited substance and/or unethical fitting practice shall be final and conclusive without recourse against BCF. Every participant, by entering the animals for exhibition, thereby releases BCF from all claims or demands whatsoever arising from any cause or happening in connection with the inspection of any such animal(s) or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion by BCF under terms of this rule.

7. Consequences for Alteration of Conformation and Structure by Prohibited Substance or Unethical Fitting. In the event any such animal(s) is declared to be in violation of prohibited

substance or unethical fitting as aforesaid, BCF may disqualify and impose such penalties in addition to those other penalties prescribed by law.

- a. Permanently bar such animal(s) from competition at the BCF;
 - b. May bar the participant from entering such animal(s), the participant's family representative or agents or any or all of them from any further participation in the BCF;
 - c. Submit name and address of participant and action taken against participant to other cooperating Livestock Exhibitions, Shows and Sales affecting eligibility;
 - d. Release to the media such actions;
 - e. In the event any award(s), banner(s), premium(s), prize(s), ribbon(s), and/or trophy(s) shall have been awarded by BCF Sponsor(s) to animal(s) exhibited in violation of these rules, the participant of such animal(s) will, upon demand of BCF, immediately return to BCF all award(s), banner(s), premium(s), prize(s), ribbon(s) and/or trophy(s) awarded to such disqualified animal(s);
 - f. Participant will be liable to BCF and shall indemnify and hold BCF harmless from all damages, including but not limited to all expenses and costs for blood, tissue, urine, hide and/or carcass sampling and testing. BCF management labor and expense(s), consultant legal and court cost(s) incurred as a result of violations of BCF rules and regulations.
8. Conduct. Any false representation, interference or unsportsmanlike conduct on the part of any participant will be dealt with by BCF according to the equities of the case. If any participant interferes in any way with the judges or shows disrespect to them, or to the show, the BCF may withhold from such participant any premium monies that may have been awarded or take any other steps deemed desirable.
9. Prohibited Substance, Drug Testing, Sabotage, Tampering, Inhumane Treatment. BCF reserves the right to question the alteration of any animal's physical or physiological structure. As a condition of participation in the BCF, participant agrees to submit to BCF, at their discretion, any animal so entered for immediate testing. Test(s) may include, but not be limited to blood, tissue and urine. Participant(s) further agree that the conclusions reached by BCF shall be final, without recourse against BCF.
10. Lesions, Fungus, and Disease. Any animal that exhibits visible signs of dermatitis, lesions, and/or fungus (ringworm), will immediately be removed from BCF grounds.

FITTING AND GROOMING OF ANIMALS

1. Junior Livestock entries must be cared for by the Junior Exhibitors of this show. Junior exhibitors are expected to have prepared their own project animal for exhibition. Junior exhibitors may receive mentoring and assistance, providing they are in attendance and participating at all times when assistance is given.
2. Exhibitor Statement: "The superintendents ask for your cooperation in minimizing the use of adult assistance in preparing animals for show at the fair. We understand the younger exhibitors will probably need some assistance. Helping an exhibitor in such a way that he/she is learning the techniques of properly preparing an exhibit is an important part of the total project experience. When an adult lends this assistance to the process, then it becomes a contest among adults, and we have lost the teaching and learning aspect of junior exhibits. Since this is a Junior Show, the goal of the superintendents is to direct the fair in such a way that it is a positive learning experience for our young exhibitors."

3. Boulder County requires that only Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley and Boulder Valley FFA members enrolled in the Boulder County 4-H & FFA programs can help each other. In addition their own immediate parents, stepparents, brothers, sisters or half-brothers or half-sisters, or legal guardian, living under the same roof, may assist the Boulder County 4-H or FFA youth with fitting, caring for and/or handling junior livestock that is deemed necessary by the head superintendent of that species. Superintendents have the responsibility to determine that said help and/or assistance is educational/demonstrational and youth is present if and when the adult is assisting with the livestock exhibit.
4. The species superintendent has the right to disqualify a junior exhibitor for infraction and abuse of this rule. Any exception/modification to this rule must be approved by the species superintendent ahead of time.
5. Should multiple exhibit and/or multiple specie conflicts occur, prohibiting the Junior Exhibitor from being present for a period of time, it is the responsibility of the Junior Exhibitor to notify the 4-H Staff or the Superintendent of the conflict, prior to the occurrence.
6. Failure to follow fitting rules may result in ineligibility to show or sale livestock at the Boulder County Fair.
7. Warnings. Under Colorado Law, it is a crime to sabotage or tamper with, administer growth stimulation drug(s) to substitute unauthorized animal(s) for exhibition livestock, pursuant to Section 18-9-207, Colorado Revised Statutes. Penalties include up to eighteen (18) months in prison or a fine up to one hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars and the name and photograph of any convicted person(s) to be made available for publication in newspapers and trade journals. Under Colorado Law, a llama professional is not liable for an injury to or the death of a participant in llama activities resulting from the inherent risks of llama activities, pursuant to Section 13-21-119, Colorado Horse Statutes.
8. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses of animals sold through sale or sales connected with the Boulder County Fair, said show and the Boulder County Fair Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee will not be liable or responsible for condition of carcass or sale price of animal. Exhibitor forfeits all rights to the sale price.
9. The Boulder County Fair and Boulder County Quality Animal Program endorse and support the USDA Wholesome Meat Act, the Meat Quality Assurance Program and insist exhibitors are in compliance. Exhibitors of all market animals (beef, dairy, goats, poultry, rabbits, sheep, swine) must certify their compliance with manufacturer's pre-market withdrawal periods specified for any and all medications, drugs, pesticides, or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of approved chemicals is strictly prohibited.
10. **A completed and signed Certificate of Statement of Disclosure (USDA Wholesome Meat Act form) will be required at the time of weigh-in at the Fair.** The certificate must be signed by a parent, junior exhibitor and the Boulder County 4-H/ St Vrain Valley FFA leader and must be turned in to the Superintendent at the time of weigh-in. No junior market animal will be allowed to show without this certification form properly filled out and signed. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue or carcasses of animals at time of or following slaughter, or if there is any evidence of tampering, the exhibitor forfeits all rights to the sale price.
11. **If a carcass is condemned for any reason, including illicit drug use and/or non-compliance of drug withdrawal times, the exhibitor will receive no payment.** The Boulder County Fair also endorses and supports the use of sound management practices in the care and feeding of all

project animals. All exhibitors of Dairy, Dairy Goat, Sheep, Beef, Swine, Poultry, Cavy, and Rabbit project animals must submit a "Certification and Statement of Disclosure" form at time of weigh in. A complete copy of the "Wholesome Meat Animal Assurance" program is available from the Extension Office.

FEED AND CARE:

1. All Junior exhibitors in whose name the entered animal is owned, and entry accepted and acknowledged, are responsible for the custody, care and feeding of their animal(s).
2. Exhibitors must furnish their own feed, feeding equipment, and bedding and must care for their own animals and exhibits. Water hoses will not be furnished at the wash racks. Exhibitors are asked to bring their own hoses.
3. Stalls and alleyways must be kept clean at all times. Stalls and pens must be cleaned each day and all refuse matter disposed of properly – as directed by one of the Livestock Team members.
4. Exhibitors must feed, water and bed, and otherwise care for the entries during the Fair. Exhibitors are expected to help keep exhibit areas, grooming areas, and barn perimeters clean and attractive. All animals and other exhibits should be kept clean and in a presentable condition at all times. The Head Superintendent for each Livestock Department and the 4-H Livestock Extension Agent reserve the right to feed and water neglected animals. Any animal found in neglect of feed, water, and/or care may be dismissed from the grounds and the exhibitor may be scratched in all entered classes with all premiums and awards forfeited.
5. Failure to observe feed and care rules may result in forfeiting premium money, immediate dismissal from the Fair, and may result in ineligibility to show the following year.
6. Barn A & B pen areas will be closed daily, to the public and exhibitors, from 9:30 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Barn A building will also be closed from 9 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. This is being done for the safety, and welfare of the livestock, and exhibitors while at the fair.

HEALTH REGULATIONS:

1. All animals to show or exhibit must be present at their appropriate animal health inspection times (if provided by that department) before being allowed into barns or stalls/pens. See individual departments for Animal Health Inspection time. **There is no charge for animal health inspections.**
2. Any livestock originating from a premise under quarantine for any disease will be barred from entry.
3. All exhibitors who have entered any of the Jr. Livestock shows agree to submit their animal for exam and/or testing that is deemed appropriate by the Boulder County Fair officials, Extension Agents, or State Animal Health Officials.
4. Random exams, testing, and sampling may be done at any time, providing it does not interfere with a livestock show for that particular animal in which the exhibitor has made entry. Owners will be informed prior to any exams, tests, or sampling that is done.
5. Veterinarians will inspect Junior Livestock entries at animal health inspections and monitor the general health of animals daily during the fair for visible signs of infection or contagious diseases. Entries found to be showing signs of an infectious or contagious disease may not be allowed to show and may be sent home. The Fair Veterinarian's decision will be final. If an animal presents signs of illness after the judging has been completed, the premiums will still be paid and awarded.
6. The superintendent in charge has the right to call for the services of a veterinarian in the

treatment of a sick animal if the exhibitor is not available. **Any veterinary fees are the responsibility of the exhibitor.**

7. Only a licensed practicing veterinarian, with a livestock superintendent or owner/exhibitor present, may administer antibiotics and or sulfonamides to any animal, including tubing an animal for bloating, while it is on the fairgrounds property.
8. Veterinarian Needs: The exhibitor should contact their own veterinarian should the need arise.

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY

1. Meat Quality Assurance Training - Each exhibitor entering a livestock project (excluding horse, cat and dog) is required to complete training and be in compliance of the Colorado State University Youth Meat Quality Assurance (MQA) program, as conducted by Extension or Agricultural Education Instructors.
 - a. Junior exhibitors must complete MQA training prior to the first time they exhibit a livestock project and repeat the training the year following their 14th birthday. Check with the Extension Office for MQA training dates and locations.
 - b. **A parent/guardian signature is required on the acceptance form that is completed at the beginning of the training and a completed test sheet must be turned in at the end.**
 - c. Deadline for the taking the MQA program is 45 days prior to the first day of the Boulder County Fair.
 - d. Failure to complete this requirement will exclude the project member from showing and/or selling at the Boulder County Fair.
2. Record Books - **All members who exhibit animal projects (dog, horse, and livestock) at the Boulder County Fair or State or National Shows (Ex: Colorado State Fair, National Western Stock Show) must turn in a (2020:Story and photos) for that species in order to be eligible to exhibit that species in next year's fair. Completed 4-H record books/and or stories/photos for each species and project exhibited must be submitted to the Boulder County Extension Office no later than the second Friday in September and completed FFA record books must be submitted to the FFA Advisor by the last Friday in September.**
 - a. Final 4-H record books will need to be in a prong-like record book cover. No three-ring binders. 4-H branded record book covers are available at the Extension Office while supplies last. Prong-like binders can be purchased at any office store as well.
 - b. If a member is ineligible to show a species in one organization (4-H or FFA), they are ineligible to show the species in another organization (4-H or FFA.)
3. Premise Identification - All entrants for livestock exhibited in 4- H/FFA breed or market competitions, including horses, shall provide a premises registration number. Rabbit, Cavy and dog entrants are excluded.

Premises ID is one component of the National Animal Identification System (NAIS). For NAIS's purposes, a premises is defined as a location or site where livestock and poultry are born, handled, housed, managed, marketed, processed, or exhibited. Premises ID is critical to rapid detection and evaluation of the scope of animal disease outbreaks and in improving emergency response efficiency. A Premises ID is not the same as a Scrapie ID (there is no ear tag associated with Premises ID). A Premises ID is always seven digits made up of both numbers and letters. If your 4-H project animal is housed/boarded somewhere other than your property, the Premises ID would need to be obtained from/through the landowner where your animals are housed. It is

simple and free to obtain a Premises ID. You can register online at

4. Final decision for eligibility will be determined by the Boulder County 4-H Extension Agent and the St. Vrain Valley and Boulder Valley FFA Advisor.

ANIMAL ELIGIBILITY

1. Ownership - All livestock entries must be the property of the eligible exhibitor. Each exhibitor must have valid written evidence of his or her ownership indicating sole ownership prior to the species identification date, which shall include brand inspection, bill of sale, affidavit, registration certificate or other written proof satisfactory to the superintendent. All papers must be available for inspection. Ownership of the animals must be established before animal is nominated and tagged.
 - a. Ownership deadline for all species is April 24th with the exception of market beef, market goat, poultry, rabbit, market sheep and market swine, which must be owned by the species designated county market nomination (ID) date. Check with the Extension Office for nomination dates. When an animal is born after April 24, the mother must be owned by April 24th unless other department rules are designated.
 - b. Non-Market animals (Dairy Cattle, Breeding Beef, Dog, Horse, Llama/Alpaca, Dairy Goats, Breeding Goats, Utility Goats, Fiber Goats, Breeding Sheep, Cavy) entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Friday in April (April 24th) of the current year using the species Animal Identification Form and uploaded on 4-HOnline enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (last Friday in April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of their project or is an official Lease-An-Animal 4-H project. (Excludes Rabbit, Poultry)
 - c. All animals will be listed and registered to a specific exhibitor. Siblings must specify ownership of specific animals. For example, steer 101 cannot be listed as John's steer and later transferred to his sister, Mary. No changes will be allowed in ownership after the nomination date.
 - d. Lease-An-Animal (LAA) participants, who have a valid, signed lease agreement accepted and filed in the Extension Office, are exempt from all ownership rules. All LAA entries must be leased, as designated on lease agreement, and shown by the eligible exhibitor.
 - e. Inspection - At any time during the project year, each exhibitor, including catch-a-calf participants, agrees to provide for inspection by the Fair Board, or its designated representative, his or her exhibits and evidence of ownership and location.
 - f. The act of entering an animal in the County Fair is the giving consent by the Junior Exhibitor for show management to obtain retinal images on any animal, at any time, and for any reason during Fair and Fair management may take action deemed appropriate based on the results of the retinal images.
2. Animal Death/Quarantine Hardship Rule - Hardship allowances for project animal death or quarantine are at the discretion of the Superintendent and must be cleared by the Extension Agent/FFA Advisor and may not be the same for every department. See Department Superintendent if animal death occurs.
 - a. Hardship is limited to showmanship classes only.

- b. Exhibitor must provide proof of death/quarantine and may only show another exhibitor's eligible project animal.
- 3. Animal Care and Housing Forms - All animal exhibitors (livestock, horse and dog) are required to fill out and turn in, with proper signatures, an Animal Care and Housing Form for all animal projects in which they are enrolled. If individuals keep their animals at their home, this information is completed in 4-H Online when you enroll. For those animals not kept at home, a hard copy form must be completed. **Forms are due to the Extension Office no later than the first Friday in May.** Failure to complete and comply with this requirement will exclude the project member from showing and/or selling at the Boulder County Fair.
- 4. Market Livestock Nomination - Each market animal must be identified by ear tag and retinal scan (beef, goat, sheep); ear tag, ear notches and hair sample (swine); leg band (poultry); or tattoo and hair sample (rabbit). Check with the Extension Office for nomination dates.
 - a. There are no make-up dates for market livestock nominations. Exhibitors may make arrangements for another family to bring your animals.
 - b. Animals missing ear tags will be retagged upon arrival at the Boulder County Fair. Other forms of identification on file (i.e. retinal scan, ear notches, hair DNA, sex, breed, etc.) will be used to verify the animal identity prior to exhibiting.
- 5. USDA Wholesome Meat Act - The United States Department of Agriculture Wholesome Meat Act applies to the sale of market livestock sold during the Boulder County Fair as follows:
 - a. Animals must be in good health and carcasses free of drug or chemical residues.
 - b. Antibiotics and sulfonamides have required withdrawal periods.
 - c. Drug label directions for use and withdrawal periods must be followed.
 - d. If drug or other chemical residues are found in tissue of carcasses, the entire carcass may be condemned.
- 6. Participants in the Pee Wee showmanship in the different livestock departments are to utilize 4-H/FFA animals that are already on the grounds. No outside animals will be allowed.

ENTRIES

- 1. All entries close the date published under the General Exhibitor Rules. Appropriate on-line forms by this published deadline.
- 2. See the Department 100, Junior Horse show for entry deadlines and guidelines.
- 3. No livestock will be permitted to return to stock trailers, trucks, or parking areas following check-in. Horses and dogs are excluded.
- 4. Stalls/pens may be assigned by the superintendent. Check with department superintendent for further information.
- 5. Substitutions - In the event a member's project animal dies or is injured, substitutions are allowed only with animals that were previously identified by the member during each species nomination/identification period.

EXHIBITING

- 1. All exhibitors, by making entry to the Boulder County Fair Junior Livestock shows, agree to abide by the Boulder County Fair General Rules, 4-H/FFA General Rules, the rules of each department(s) entered and the code of conduct of 4-H and FFA.
- 2. Exhibitors must also follow the Colorado 4-H Dress Code while exhibiting and representing 4-H

with their projects. FFA members also must follow the Colorado 4-H Dress Code unless wearing official dress.

3. Animals not entered in regularly scheduled classes will not be permitted on the grounds.
4. Underweight/Overweight Animals - Overweight animals will be shown in Overweight classes. Underweight animals will be shown in underweight classes. Underweight and overweight animals are not eligible for Champion or Reserve Champion classes or for the Junior Livestock Sale but may be used in showmanship classes. See species department for weight limits and if overweight/underweight classes are available.
5. Class Calls - All exhibitors will be given three (3) calls prior to the start of each class. The class will commence when the ring steward signals the judge, and no additional exhibitors will be admitted. Failure to show animals when class is called will not justify a class recall.
6. Conflicting Classes - In the event that an exhibitor is needed in two different livestock show rings, the exhibitor must notify both superintendents to work out scheduling. Superintendents will try to adjust judging schedule to accommodate but will not hold the show for an exhibitor.
7. Control of Animal - Any livestock deemed uncontrollable by the superintendent will be excused from the show ring or the fairgrounds depending on the severity of the situation.
 - a. All exhibitors must control and show their own animal.
 - b. In the event an exhibitor has more than one animal in a class, another Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley/Boulder Valley FFA member may show it for them.
 - c. In the event, a younger Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley/Boulder Valley FFA member feels uncomfortable showing their animal they may have an older Boulder County 4-H or St. Vrain Valley/Boulder Valley FFA member assist them.
8. Combining/Splitting Classes - It is not the intention of the Boulder County Fair to create classes for each individual animal. A class should have at least three entries to make up a competitive class. When there are less than three entries in a class, the superintendent may allow individual entries to be judged or may combine classes at his/her discretion. Large classes may also be split into smaller classes.
9. Champion/Reserve Champion Selection - All animals that are breed, weight, age or class champions or reserve champions must return to show ring and be judged in the picking of the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion. Failure to do so results in all premium money and prizes being forfeited along with the right to sell any animal in the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
10. Awards & Premiums - Ribbons and premiums will be given to winners in each class as awarded. No awards will be made to an unworthy animal or other exhibit. If classes are not filled, placing will be made according to the merits of the entries as the judge sees it. Trophies may be awarded based on availability. The decisions of the judge shall be final.
11. Animal Disqualified - Should any animal awarded a cash prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prize shall graduate up into the higher positions next in order above them, if, in the opinion of the judge, these animals are worthy of such prizes. If the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion animal(s) are disqualified, no further advancement or replacement of animal(s) will be made. All award(s), banner(s), premium(s), prize(s), ribbon(s), and/or trophy(s) will be forfeit and returned.
12. Premiums - payouts will be awarded as follows unless stated otherwise in a specific department.

Additional awards and premiums may be given as sponsorship and donations are available at time of judging.

OUT-OF-COUNTY FAIRS, SHOWS, AND EXHIBITIONS ENTRIES:

1. Members planning on exhibiting animals at any national or regional shows such as the Colorado State Fair, Ak-Sar-Ben, American Royal, National Western Stock Show, or any others, must know and adhere to the entry deadlines for those individual shows, fairs or exhibitions.
2. Each fair, show or exhibition has specific nomination, entry forms deadlines, and specific requirements for that event. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to find out these specific dates and requirements.
3. If the out-of-county fair, show or exhibition, (i.e. Colorado State Fair or Ak-Sar-Ben) require a Boulder County Fair livestock ear tag, you must complete the Boulder County Fair tag-in process for that species of animal on the set animal nomination date.
4. Club leaders or FFA Advisors will need to collect the DNA samples prior to the nomination date of the out-of-county fair and submit the DNA samples back to the Extension Office by the species deadline set by that show.
5. No animal sold in the Boulder County Fair Jr. Market Sale is eligible to enter or compete at the Colorado State Fair.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES

1. **The Junior Livestock Sale** this year will be a virtual premium sale. Show Circuit Online Sales will host the sale online. We will not be selling the animals; we are asking sponsors to donate directly to the exhibitors in effort to reward their hard work and dedication to this year's project and to nurture the future of agriculture in our County.
2. Each market exhibitor will get to nominate 1 animal for the sale. Market exhibitors must complete the google form to nominate an animal. All the required information must be uploaded along with a sale photo. The sale photo should be of the exhibitor and their animal much like our sale photos of the past. (See below) **The sale photo MUST have a file name that matches the exhibitor name.** Nominations will be due by Monday, July 27th at 5pm, no late entries will be accepted. The exhibitors information will be uploaded to a SC Online sales by the Sale Committee. The Sale will be open from Saturday, August 8th at 2pm until Saturday, August 15th at 7pm. However an in person walk in will be available on Saturday, August 8th from 2- 5pm in the Exhibit Building for those needing or wanting to contribute in that way.
3. The sale catalog can be found on Show Circuit Online Sales (sconlinesales.com) and view each of the exhibitor's lots. Any sponsor can donate to the exhibitors in \$25 increments, which will go directly to the Exhibitor. There will not be a high bid or a winner; rather multiple sponsors can give to the same lot, so marketing by the exhibitor is highly encouraged.
4. Photos of the **nominated** animal with the exhibitor are required **in order to** be posted for the sale. There will also be a 5.5% commission deducted for operating expenses **from the total of each exhibitors check.**
5. Sale order–Exhibitors with Champions and Reserve Champions will sell first. If an exhibitor is the winner of multiple Grands or Reserves, they will be recognized as the exhibitor of each Grand or Reserve, but only the nominated animal is eligible for the sale. Then General Sale order will be Goats, Rabbits, Lambs, Turkeys, Beef, Poultry, **and** Swine, will sell. Random drawing **will** position **the remaining** species.
6. All sponsors/donors for each exhibitor will require a thank you letter hand delivered to the Fair Office. **Failure to submit these letters to the Boulder County Fair Office by the second Friday in September will result in a \$100.00 fee being deducted from the exhibitor's check.**
7. **Even though the animal is not being sold,** all animals will be inspected by the respective Livestock Superintendent for that department with that species to assure quality is adequate, **to sell.**
8. **Wholesome Meat Assurance Act** (Sale Intent) Forms are due back to each respective Livestock Superintendent no later than **weigh in or check in**, (times and details to be determined by each Livestock Superintendent). Online forms will be used in most departments. Failure to return the Form on time will result in the exhibitor not **going through the sale.**

9. The entering, marketing, presentation and sale of all entries in the Boulder County Livestock Sale will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. Under no circumstances will the management of the Boulder County Fair, the Junior Livestock Sale Committee, the Boulder County Extension Office, or any individual assisting with the fair be held responsible for the marketing. Exhibitors **in the sale** must still turn in the **Wholesome Meat Assurance Act form** to their Livestock Superintendent by the deadline or the member will not be allowed to sell through the Junior Livestock Sale.
10. **Drug Testing:** If drug testing is ordered by a regulatory agency **(on any animal from resale)**, an additional fee will be assessed to the exhibitor, if the test is positive. Fee costs will then be paid directly by the exhibitor or deducted from the Junior Market Livestock Sale check if sufficient funds exist.
11. **Payment will be made to the Exhibitor when:** "Thank you letter(s)" addressed to each **donor** (if there are multiple **donors**) is **hand-delivered** to the **Fair** Office **when checks** become available, but no later than the second Friday in September (with postage, and return address on envelope). Checks will not be released until **the** thank you note(s) are turned into the **Fair** Office. NOTE: **Donor** names and addresses will be available from **Fair** Office 10 days from the **conclusion of the** sale.
12. Minimum sale requirements: **(market rabbits are exempt this year)**.
 - a. All market animals must be tagged in at spring tagging dates.
 - b. All animals must have been exhibited in a Boulder County Fair Jr. Market class and shown by said exhibitor.
 - c. All animals must meet sale-quality requirements.
 - d. All animals must meet Boulder County Fair Market Animal requirements to be eligible for the sale (see market class for details).
 - e. A quality photo of the **nominated** animal with the exhibitor dressed in Showmanship attire **must accompany the nomination form online by Monday, July 27th deadline.** (Rabbits included)
 - f. Beef: All market beef members must bring **original** brand inspection papers to the fair at **weigh in** for Brand Inspector's use. **Those not selling animals to resale will be returned to exhibitors later.** All market ewe lambs and market does must have a Scrapie flock ID tag present for sale.
13. An exhibitor may **nominated only one animal for the sale and must have been nominated online along with a sale quality photo of exhibitor & animal by Monday, July 27 at 5pm deadline**
14. Male market animals must be castrated or banded prior to the first weigh-in date in the spring. Owners will refund **resale** money to the buyer if their animals are found to have testicles in the body cavity at the time of processing. Poultry market chickens and market turkeys are exempt from this requirement for health and safety reasons.
15. All Wholesome Meat Assurance Act rules and regulations must be adhered to. See Jr. Exhibitor Livestock and Animal General Rules under USDA Wholesome Meat Act.
16. **Nominated animals posted on Show Circuit Online Sales for** the Boulder County Fair Junior livestock market sale is **ineligible** for any market classes at the Colorado State Fair.
17. A resale buyer will purchase any market project animal **BUT the exhibitor must have indicated this option at nomination time and must deliver the animal(s) to a designated time and place for pick up. Sale price will be the current market price. All brand papers will be collected at the time of weigh in. Check with superintendent for delivery date/time.**

DEPARTMENT 100 - JUNIOR HORSE SHOW

To Register:

1. Obtain a horse show entry form from your 4-H organizational leader and use the schedule (below) to list classes you wish to compete in, using a separate form per horse.
2. Ask your 4-H organizational leader to review and approve your entries.
3. When your 4-H organizational leader has approved your entries, register at: www.fairentry.com. Click on "Find Your Fair." On the right side of the screen, under Colorado section, select "2020 Boulder County Fair." Register for classes under 4-H Horse project.

ENTRIES CLOSE August 3, 2020 through FairEntry- You must have Video ready when doing your entry. No changes to videos after entries close.

Horse ID Sheets:

HORSE ID SHEETS MUST BE COMPLETED ONLINE NO LATER THAN THE LAST FRIDAY IN APRIL (APRIL 24, 2020), FOR ANY HORSES THAT ARE TO BE SHOWN AT THE 2020 BOULDER COUNTY FAIR. HARDSHIP CASES WILL BE CONSIDERED AFTER THE LAST FRIDAY IN APRIL-ONLY IN THE CASE OF THE DEATH OF A PROJECT HORSE.

- a) Substitution will be considered upon presentation of a certificate of death no later than four (4) days before check in of the Boulder County Fair Horse Show. Death certificates must be presented to the county 4-H Extension Agent overseeing the horse program by the above deadline.
- b) Replacement 4-H horses must be selected from identified horses in the Boulder County 4-H Horse Program by another 4-H member.
- c) Rule from the Colorado state rule book about sharing horses in members above level I are still in effect. Rule # 4D under General Rules and Requirements.
- d) Classes may be limited due to scheduling conflicts among members utilizing the same horse.

Deadline:

FAIR HORSE SHOW REGISTRATIONS SHALL BE COMPLETED ONLINE ON THE BOULDER COUNTY "FAIR ENTRY" SYSTEM NO LATER August 3, 2020. **NO LATE FAIR HORSE SHOW REGISTRATIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED. Your entry includes uploading your videos.**

GENERAL RULES

THERE ARE ADDITIONAL RULES FOR SPECIFIC CLASSES – See Boulder County Horse Safety Rules, Boulder County Horse Project/Show Rules, Colorado 4-H Horse Rule Book, and Boulder County 4-H Driving Rules.

1. **No one may approach a judge without explicit permission from show management; under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator badger, insult or be argumentative with a horse show judge, show secretary, ring steward or show management. No one may approach the horse show fair superintendent with a dispute, without his/her organizational leader present to moderate. Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to a judge, ring steward, or show management, by or on behalf of the exhibitor, may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and/or forfeiture of awards or expulsion from the show grounds for the person, and/or exhibitor.**
3. Current Colorado 4-H Horse Rule Book, Boulder County Horse Project and Show Rules, Boulder County Horse Safety Rules, and Boulder County 4-H Driving Rules will apply. In the event of conflict, Boulder County 4-H Horse Rules will take precedence.
4. Judging will be **done virtually for the 2020 Fair.**
5. Show management reserves the right to change the order of classes.
6. Classes may be split or combined by age or random order by the show officials as entries warrant. Please check final class lists on show day and notify show management if you feel there is a discrepancy.
7. Age of exhibitor is determined as of December 31st of the prior year. Junior members are 8-10 years old; Intermediate members are 11-13 years old; Senior members are 14-18 years old.
8. Age of horse is determined as of January 1st of the year foaled.
9. **All exhibitors are required to compete at the level of the 4-H card held or the highest level riding test passed in that discipline.** Those members not yet holding a card or having passed a riding test compete as Unrated. All showmanship exhibitors are required to compete at the highest level showmanship test passed. Those members not yet holding a card in showmanship or who have not passed the Level I showmanship test will compete as unrated in showmanship.

Members must be riding at Level I or higher in the appropriate discipline to enter:

 - Western Riding, Reining, Trail
 - Ranch Horse (must hold Level I Ranch Horse card / have passed Level I Ranch Horse riding test)
 - English Control and classical Dressage
 - Western Dressage – must hold a Level I or higher Western card, or have passed Level I or higher Western riding test
 - Gymkhana – must hold a Level I or higher Western card, or have passed Level I or higher Western riding test

Members must be riding at Level II or higher in appropriate discipline to enter:

 - Show Hack classes and Hunter Hack classes
 - Working ranch horse classes (classes which require working with cattle) - must hold a Level II, III or IV working ranch horse card, or have passed Level II or higher Ranch Horse riding test.
 - Trainer Horse classes
10. Any exhibitor who shows Level III or Level IV may show in all Championship Level III or IV classes in which he/she also showed Level III or Level IV in the qualifying Fair classes regardless of placing. (e.g.: If exhibitor showed in Level IV Showmanship, that exhibitor may show Level IV Showmanship Championship.)
11. Members may show only one horse in each class with the exception of halter classes. In halter classes when scheduling conflicts arise, if necessary, a member may have another 4-H member show a horse, with the other 4-H member using the assigned back number of the horse being shown. Registered horses must show under the specific breed, if offered. **Horses registered with more than one registry or meeting criteria for more than one halter class may show in only one halter class.** Specify the breed and type of the horse on the entry card. Copies of registration papers may be requested with fair entry.

12. **No one but a 4-H member may school horses during the Boulder County Fair 4-H Horse Show (except in the Nelson Road practice arena).**
13. In classical Dressage classes, a smooth snaffle bit is required. A list and pictures of allowable bits are available in the State Rule Book or through club leaders. Copies of the current USDF dressage tests are available online. Ride times may be assigned for Classical Dressage and Western Dressage. See westerndressageassociation.org rules for Western Dressage tack and rules.
14. For Western Riding & Reining classes, Level III & IV must perform flying lead changes; simple lead changes must be penalized. Level I & II must perform simple lead changes; flying lead changes must be penalized.
15. For riders entered in any English classes, including on-the-flat classes, a helmet is required.
16. Competitors must be level II to jump.
17. Therapeutic Horsemanship and Showmanship (English or Western): Disabled 4-H members may compete in these classes, but riders may not cross-enter into any other class. An exhibitor in the Therapeutic class may elect to have another 4-H member ride or exhibit in the class (but not be judged) so said exhibitor is not the only rider in the class. If a member wishes to elect this option, notify the organizational leader to make the arrangements prior to the class.
18. Walk/Trot Horsemanship (English and Western) – This class is for Unrated riders in their first or second year of the horse project as well as disabled/therapeutic riders at their discipline. These riders may not cross-enter any class (English or Western) that canters or lopes.
19. **No written tests in 2020.**
20. Patterns for all pattern classes will be posted online **prior to the Fair Entry deadline**. Patterns will be conducted before rail work. Pattern and rail classes will be judged 60% on the pattern, 40% on the rail work. It is the judge's discretion to conduct the rail work one way or both ways of the ring.

Non-Market animals (Dairy Cattle, Breeding Beef, Dog, Horse, Llama/Alpaca, Dairy Goats, Breeding Goats, Utility Goats, Fiber Goats, Breeding Sheep) entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Friday in April of (April 24th) of the current year using the species Animal Identification Form and uploaded on 4-HOnline enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (last Friday in April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of their project or is an official Lease-An-Animal 4-H project. (Excludes Rabbit, Poultry,)
4. All bulls must be born in 2020 and nursing his dam. Bulls will only be shown in cow/calf class.

5. Cow/calf class, cow of any age and calf must be born in 2020.
6. Heifer calves born in 2019 must be weaned to show as an individual.

4. The USDA Wholesome Meat Act form and Livestock Sale Intent form are to be signed by exhibitor & parent by July 27th electronically this year. Please see sale rules for other specifics for participation this year.
5. All exhibitors must bring their brand papers for verification when their animal crosses the scale for weigh in at fair.
6. **Animal Health Inspection will take place upon arrival.**
7. **Market steers and heifers that do not meet the minimum weight requirements will fall into the feeder class and are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Market Sale.**
8. **Market steers and heifers that do not meet the minimum rate of gain requirements are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Sale.** A market animal should gain an average of xxxlbs per day over the life of the project as a goal, however the minimum rate of gain to be eligible for the junior market sale is 1.0lbs per day.
9. **All market heifers must be open (not pregnant).**

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Dairy Cattle project are eligible to enter classes under Department 375. Only the exhibitor may lead cattle for the fair entry photos and video.
1. When registering fair entries, each animal will also require 1 photo collage showing the right & left profile view; a front & rear view of a clean, groomed animal (4 total photos in the collage) and 1 video showing the same but in movement all taken in **July 2020**. In the video, the exhibitor must be in full show attire. If for any reason the show cannot be held live, the photos & video you submit at the time of entry will be used for a virtual show.
2. Exhibitors are required to wear a closed leather shoe/boot and dress in whites for fair entry photos/video & the show. (White button up shirt/Polo & white pants)
3. This is a show, so all animals should be clipped, clean and well groomed. Preference will be given to those who take pride in presenting their animals in this fashion.
4. Classes will be judged using the current PDCA guidelines & the showmanship scorecard.
5. Females may be purebred or high grade. All animals to show must be on the exhibitors' dairy cattle Animal Identification Form, complete with ALL the required information & uploads. This Dairy Cattle Animal Identification Form must be completed by the last Friday in April (April 24th) at 4honline.com. Calves born after April 24th of current year has 30 days from birth to enroll them on the Animal Identification Form hard copy and submit to the Extension Office. Registered animals must be registered or leased by an association under the name of the exhibitor. Current association leases must have been uploaded to the Dairy Cattle Animal Identification Form & filed with the county by the Last Friday in April deadline. FFA members must also turn in completed form to your FFA Advisor before the set deadline (before the last Friday in April) of the current year along with photos and ownership papers, where they will be passed along to the Extension Office by the last Friday in April.
6. Several large donations from sponsors have contributed to this show so all exhibitors are expected to fill out multiple thank you cards, and award winners from select classes will have additional cards to complete. These cards will be provided at the show and are to be turned in to the superintendent in a timely manner to be exchanged for awards and premiums earned at a later date.

3. Masks must be worn by everyone on the grounds outside of vehicles at all times. Families may be in groups but all others must maintain at least 6' or more apart at all times. Please avoid touching/leaning/sitting on common fixed surfaces (fencing, water faucets, etc) without sanitizing the surface first. Outside of family NO sharing of any equipment (brushes, halters, buckets, wheelbarrows, shovels, etc).
4. **Please keep cattle at trailer until animals have had a visual health inspection to exhibit.**
5. Exhibitors are required to wear a closed leather shoe/boot and dress in whites in the show ring and in videos (White button up shirt/Polo & white pants)
6. Showmanship will start the dairy show, starting with Juniors; Intermediates; then Seniors. GENERAL RULES

This is an extraordinary year. With some form of virus-related restrictions expected to remain in place through the summer, the 2020 Boulder County 4-H Dog Show has been modified to accommodate current Health Department requirements. These rules contemplate a **live 4-H Dog Show** with limited in-person judging, small group sizes, social distancing, and restrictions on the number of entries. This year's show also includes a **display board** option for members to complete the 4-H Dog Project exhibition requirement without face-to-face contact. **In the event virus conditions escalate and the in-person 4-H Dog Show is cancelled, video entries for Showmanship, Rally and Obedience may be considered for project completion and State Fair Dog Contest eligibility. All members planning to enter the in-person contest should also upload a 4-H Virtual Fun Match or other video to Fair Entry for the appropriate class. These videos will be judged ONLY if the in-person 4-H Dog Show is cancelled prior to the contest.**

Please read these rules carefully since some classes and requirements have changed.

1. All participants MUST comply with current Health Department requirements, including:
 - All participants MUST wear a mask at ALL times.
 - All participants MUST maintain social distancing of 6 or more feet at ALL times.
 - All participants MUST wash or sanitize their hands and equipment after leaving the ring.
 - No sharing of equipment.
 - No crating of animals inside or outside the building.

- Group size may not exceed 10 persons at any one time.
 - Health department guidance for group size will prohibit spectators during the show
2. The only training equipment allowed in the Obedience and Rally ring is a slip, chain, flat buckle or clip collar without tags and a nylon or leather leash. No halties, gentle leaders, slip leads, harnesses or pinch collars are allowed. The same collars are allowed without tags in the Showmanship ring, but handlers may use any length leash, martingale or other show lead to exhibit their dog. No bait or treats are allowed in the Obedience or Rally rings. Bait may be used in the Showmanship ring at the discretion of the judge.
 3. If a dog has failed an exercise, it will not ordinarily be re-judged unless the judge feels the dog's performance was prejudiced by peculiar and unusual conditions. In such a case, the judge may elect to re-judge the dog only on the portion of the exercise in which the unusual condition occurred.
 4. Exhibitors must comply with the Colorado State 4-H Dress Code.
 5. NO dogs are allowed beyond the immediate vicinity of the indoor arena unless returning to or from the car. Dogs are not allowed to enter other barns, or buildings on the fairgrounds.
 6. Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning up after their dogs both inside and outside the arena.
 7. Dogs must be on leash at all times except when performing off leash exercises in the show ring.
 8. In addition to the BCF General Rules, General Exhibitor Rules and all Junior Exhibitor Livestock and Animal Division Rules, exhibitors must also comply with the policies adopted by the Boulder County Dog Advisory Committee including the rules regarding Shared Family Dogs and Borrowed Dogs, as posted on the Boulder County 4-H Dog Project web page.

ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in the 4-H Dog Project are eligible to enter classes under Department 400.
2. Participants must own their project dog individually or in partnership with immediate family members or guardians during the complete duration of the project.
3. An exhibitor may enter more than one dog in the contest, but **ONLY ONE** dog may be entered in each discipline – 1 dog entry for Rally, 1 dog entry for Showmanship and 1 dog entry for Obedience.
4. The progress the dog has made and the number of years the handler has been in the dog project determines the correct class to enter. The Beginner Novice Obedience **level A** class is open to first-year dog project members only, and the Beginner Novice B level class is only open to second year dog project members with the same dog and youth team that showed the previous year. Youth that are experienced handlers but are working with a new or different dog than previous years should enter the Beginner Novice C **level** class. First year handlers working with an experienced dog should also enter the Beginner Novice C **level** class. Youth entered in Beginner Novice A or C-1 who receive a qualifying score at County Fair may move to the Beginner Novice B or C-2 level the following year. In all other Obedience and Rally classes, the **A level** classes are open to first year contestants only. Second year contestants who have not yet received a qualifying score in that **class** and youth competing with a different dog need to be entered in the B level classes.
5. **All 2020 4-H Dog Project members will have the option to repeat the same competition class for the 2020-2021 4-H year without penalty.**

DOG ELIGIBILITY RULES

1. Only dogs with a 4-H Dog ID completed in 4-H Online by the last Friday in April (April 24th) are eligible to enter classes under Department 400.
2. Proof of current rabies, distemper and parvovirus vaccination must be presented upon check-in. Rabies tag number must be on the entry form under the Registration Tag category. Rabies vaccines must be administered by a licensed veterinarian. Titers will be accepted in accordance with the State 4-H Dog Contest Rules.
3. A dog with an AKC title or a title from another national dog association is disqualified from entering the class for which that title was awarded or any lower class, except if that title was won less than four months before the State fair, and then the dog is eligible for entry in the same class. The exceptions to this titling rule are Grad Novice, Open, Grad Open, and Utility Obedience; and Rally Advanced/Excellent and Masters Rally. Rule 1 above, takes precedence over this rule.
4. Dogs that qualify at State Fair in Beginner Novice are NOT eligible to compete in that same Division at any subsequent State Fair. However, dogs that qualify at State Fair in Beginner Novice A or C-1 MAY participate in the Beginner Novice B or C-2 level class at a subsequent Boulder County Fair. No bitch in heat will be allowed to compete in any dog class. A Boulder County Fair Livestock Show & Rodeo veterinarian's decision on doubtful cases will be accepted as final.
5. Dog show officials can and will dismiss any entrant or their family from the show for any mistreatment of dogs entered in the show. If a question should arise as to what constitutes mistreatment, 4-H Staff and/or officials will meet to discuss appropriate action in each case. Dismissal from the show will result in the forfeiture of any awards.

STATE FAIR DOG TRAILS:

1. Virus conditions will affect the Colorado State Fair 4-H Dog Contest and could require limitations on group/class size and building occupancy, limits on member and dog entries, and limitations on spectators. Refer to the Colorado State Fair 4-H Dog Contest Requirements for contest rules.
2. After earning a qualifying score in competition at the Boulder County Fair, the exhibitor may be eligible to show at State Fair. For this year only, Qualifying scores are 165 and above in obedience and showmanship and 65 and above in rally. The top two qualifying scores in each class will have the first opportunity to show at State Fair. The next highest qualifying scores will be considered for any remaining spots. If the in-person Boulder County Fair 4-H Dog Contest is cancelled due to virus concerns, qualifying scores from videos MAY be considered for state fair eligibility this year.
3. Once scores are made available, eligible exhibitors must notify the Dog Superintendent of their decision to participate in State Fair, and which classes they will be entering.
4. There will be no Team Rally competition at County or State Fair this year.

AWARDS:

Class placements will be announced by email the day following the County Fair Junior Dog Contest Awards and scoresheets will be available for pick-up at a date, location and time TBD.

1. Ribbons will be awarded to the 1st - 5th place exhibitors in each of the **Exhibit**, Obedience, Showmanship and Rally classes.
2. Depending on the number of entries, a Champion and Reserve Champion may be awarded in each Division (ie; **Exhibit**, *Beginner Novice, Novice, Grad Novice, Advanced, Veterans*).
3. An Overall Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded to the highest scoring exhibitors in each discipline (Obedience, Rally and Showmanship). Dogs entered in Veterans Obedience are not eligible to compete for the Overall Obedience awards.
4. **There will be no Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion awards this year.**
5. The top two scorers in each class are eligible to go to State Fair.
6. **There will be no Small Animal Round Robin Contest this year.**

CLASSES

Two judging options will be offered this year for members to complete their 4-H exhibition requirement. The first option will include a new **VIRTUAL Exhibition** class requiring a display board demonstration of knowledge about dogs and dog showmanship. No video entries will be required for this new class and Exhibition entries are not eligible for State Fair competition. The new Virtual Exhibition class is a great option for participants whose dogs are not quite ready for ring competition or members who do not feel safe participating in a face-to-face event.

The second option includes the regular **IN-PERSON Competition** classes for Rally, Obedience and Showmanship. Members who participate in In-Person judging may be eligible to participate in State Fair.

In the event the In-Person County Fair Dog Show is cancelled due to virus concerns, video entries may be considered for project completion and State Fair eligibility. Members who are interested in competing at State Fair should upload video entries to Fair Entry for each of their classes. Video entries may be filmed at a 4-H Virtual Fun Match, at home or at another training event. **The deadline for Entering these classes is August 3, 2020.**

1. All 4-H Dog Contest participants (Virtual or In-Person) are required to submit a completed Record Book (*minimum requirement of the 4-H Story and 4 captioned photos of your project*).
2. The number of judging rings and number of class participants will be determined by Health Department restrictions.
3. All 4-H Obedience and Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Please see the AKC website for details www.AKC.org. Some exercises and rules have been adapted from AKC to better serve the youth of this program.
4. Judges will determine tie breakers for Obedience and Showmanship, and may use the following criteria to make their decision:

- Judge's determination based on performance
- Showmanship test results
- Score on a specific showmanship question
- Score on a specific obedience exercise

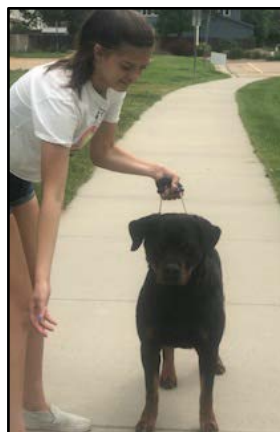
EXHIBIT REQUIREMENTS – All materials for these class entries must be uploaded to Fair Entry in PDF format. **The deadline for submitting entries for these classes is August 3, 2020**

Members may prepare exhibit materials using Word, Powerpoint, or any other software product that can be converted to a PDF format. PDFs must be uploaded to Fair Entry prior to the submission deadline. Each exhibit must include the information requested below. **Please use the 4-H Dog Resource Handbook for reference.**

- **TITLE PAGE OR HEADING** – The Exhibit must include the **County, Member Name, Project Area, and Class** (Example: *Boulder County, Jane Doe, Dog Project, Virtual Dog Project Exhibit, Class 101, Dog Project Exhibit- Junior Level*)
- **STACKING** – Please label this section and include the definition of “Stacking”. Include three captioned photos of the member and the dog stacked in position appropriate for the breed. Photos should be taken close enough to completely capture the dog and member. One captioned photo should be taken facing the dog and the member (Example 1). A second captioned photo should depict the dog from the front (Example 2) and the third captioned photo should depict the dog from the rear (Example 3). All dogs should be stacked on the ground. Members should present in appropriate showmanship attire.

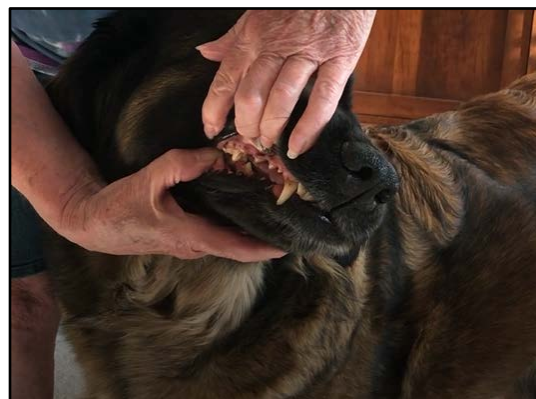

OBEDIENCE CLASSES

Obedience exercises are patterned after the AKC guidelines wherever possible and are explained in the Dog Resource Handbook. You can also visit www.AKC.org for detailed explanations of the exercises. Some classes and exercises have been modified from AKC guidelines to better serve our 4-H youth. For this year only, a qualifying score in Obedience will be 165 out of the possible 200 points. In all Obedience classes, ten points will be deducted for the following: strong correcting, disciplining, fouling the ring, excessive barking, leaving the ring, rules violation or showing fear. Explanation of Pre-Graduate Novice A & B Exercises

Moving Stand and Examination: This exercise is performed off leash. The judge will give the command “forward,” at which time the handler will heel forward with his/her dog. After the handler has proceeded forward about ten feet, the judge will give the command “stand your dog.” Without pausing, the handler will command and/or signal the dog to stand and continue forward about 10 to 12 feet and turn and face the dog. The judge will approach the dog from the front, give a novice exam and give the command “return to your dog.” The handler will return to his/her dog by going around and behind and back to heel position.

Moving Drop on Recall: The principle feature of this exercise is that the dog heels and executes a prompt response to the handler’s command and/or signal to down and remain in the down position until called or signaled to come on command. Orders for the exercise are “Forward,” “Down your dog,” “Call your dog” and “Finish.” The handler will stand with the dog sitting in the heel position at a point designated by the judge, who will then ask, “Are you ready?” and order “Forward.” The handler may command or signal his/her dog to heel and will walk briskly and naturally. After he/she has gone about 15 feet, the judge will order “Down your dog.” Without pausing, the handler will command and/or signal the dog to down. The handler will continue forward to the end of the ring, turn around and stand in a natural manner facing the dog. On the judge’s orders or signals, the handler will command or signal the dog to come and immediately sit in front of the handler until the command to “Finish” is given by the judge.

Recall Over Broad Jump: The principle feature of this exercise is that the dog stays until directed to jump, clears the jump on a single command or signal, and immediately returns to sit in front of the handler. Orders are “Leave your dog,” “Call your dog” and “Finish.” The handler will stand with his/her dog sitting in the heel position at least eight feet from the jump, facing the lowest end of the lowest hurdle. When the judge orders “Leave your dog,” the handler will give the command and/or signal to stay, go at least eight feet beyond the highest edge of the last hurdle, turn, and face the dog as in the Novice recall. On the judge’s order, the handler will give the command or signal to jump. The dog must clear the entire distance of the broad jump without touching it and, without any further command or signal, immediately sit in front of the handler until the command to “Finish” is given by the judge.

CLASS #10: Graduate Novice A & B

Graduate Novice A is open to experienced handlers in their first year of Graduate Novice dog training. Graduate Novice B is open to experienced handlers in their second or higher year of Grad Novice dog training. The youth and dog team may continue to compete in this class even after receiving a qualifying **score in Graduate Novice Obedience at** a previous State or County Fair. Some of the exercises in these classes have been modified from AKC guidelines to better meet the needs of 4-H youth.

VETERANS DIVISION – Obedience Classes Only

The purpose of the Veterans Obedience Division is to allow older or disabled dogs to continue to participate in obedience competitions. Any dog 7 years or older may be entered in the Veterans Division. It is the choice of the handler, the handler's parent, and the handler's trainer and veterinarian whether to exhibit a dog in a Veteran class. Veteran dogs will compete at the obedience level the handler chooses, from Novice up through Utility. All exercises are the same as for regular obedience classes except for the jump height. Veterans Division dogs will be allowed to jump $\frac{1}{2}$ of their regulation jump height. They are required to perform all other exercises as in the regular class; jump height will be the only difference from the regular class. Once a Veteran dog can no longer jump at least $\frac{1}{2}$ their regulation jump height they must be moved to a class that does not require jumping. The Veterans classes and scoring adjustments are listed below:

Class 14: Novice Veterans: Judge's score

Class 15: Pre-Grad Novice Veterans: Judge's score plus 3 points

Class 16: Grad Novice Veterans: Judge's score plus 6 points

Class 17: Open Veterans: Judge's score plus 9 points

Class 18: Grad Open Veterans: Judge's score plus 12 points

Class 19: Utility Veterans: Judge's score plus 15 points

If a dog is entered as a Veteran during a project year, they may go back to regular obedience classes the following year; however, they must go back to the level they would have been competing at before they moved to the Veterans Division. Dogs entered in the Veterans Division are not eligible to compete for the Overall Obedience or Grand Champion awards at County Fair. Veteran dogs will jump $\frac{1}{2}$ the required height for their class. Refer to the chart below for the standard High or Bar Jump heights.

For the Broad Jump: The Broad Jump will cover a distance equal to twice the standard height of the High or Bar Jump setting for each dog. Veteran dogs will jump $\frac{1}{2}$ the required width for their class and must use the correct number of boards for the width being jumped: *Four boards are used for 48-72 inches *Three boards are used for 28-44 inches *Two boards are used for 16-24 inches *One board is used for 8 inches.

SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

A written test will be given to each contestant entered in a Showmanship class. The exhibitor is responsible for taking the test at the designated time. If the exhibitor does not take the test within the designated time, they will receive zero points for that portion of their showmanship score.

For this year only, a qualifying score in Showmanship will be 165 points out of the possible 200 points. Class size will be determined by Health Department restrictions in place at the time of the show. In some instances, members may need to perform their exercises individually in the ring.

During the Showmanship class each area of judging will be evaluated throughout the entire class. The score will reflect the handler's ability to perform these items throughout the class and not just at one time. For example: the dog should be stacked (either hand stacked or free stacked) upon entering the ring, during the exam, after the pattern, and any time they are in the line-up. The "set-up" score will reflect all of these times when the dog is stacked.

JUNIOR DIVISION

There will be no Junior Novice Showmanship class offered this year.

CLASS #21: Junior Open - This class is for participants who are 8-10 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

INTERMEDIATE DIVISON

There will be no Intermediate Novice Showmanship Class offered this year.

CLASS #23: Intermediate Open - This class is for participants who are 11-13 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

SENIOR DIVISION

There will be no Senior Novice Showmanship class offered this year.

CLASS #25: Senior Open - This class is for participants who are 14-18 years old as of December 31 of the previous year with previous experience in Showmanship, either with 4-H or with a national dog association.

ADVANCED DIVISION

CLASS #26: Intermediate Advanced – This class is for experienced handlers who are 11-13 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year and who placed 1st through 10th at a previous State Fair Dog Trial in Intermediate Open Showmanship.

CLASS #27: Senior Advanced - This class is for experienced handlers who are 14-18 years of age as of December 31 of the previous year and who placed 1st through 10th at a previous State Fair Dog Trial in Senior Open Showmanship.

CLASS #28: Master Showman - This class is only for Intermediate or Senior handlers who have placed as Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion Showman at a previous State 4-H Dog Trial. At the judge's discretion, any exhibitor who has qualified to show in the Master Showman class at State Fair may compete with the Senior Advanced class at the Boulder County Fair, but will be judged at a higher level (fewer expected errors) than other exhibitors in the Senior Advanced class.

RALLY OBEDIENCE

The Colorado State 4-H Dog Program has adopted the changes to Rally Obedience as promulgated by the American Kennel Club in November 2017. **For this year only, a** qualifying score in Rally **is 65** out of the 100 possible points.

1. Prior to the start of each class, a 10 to 15 minute walk through (without dogs) is allowed for the handlers to familiarize themselves with the course pattern. Only during this time, handlers may ask the judge to clarify or answer any questions about the Rally signs or the Rally course.
2. The judge will tell the handler when to begin the Rally course. The dog and handler will proceed at their own pace through a course of designated stations.
3. Unlimited communication from the handler to the dog is encouraged. Multiple commands and/or signals using one or both arms are allowed. Arms and hands do not need to be maintained in any particular position at any time. The handler may not touch the dog or make any physical corrections any time. Exhibitors in the Excellent and higher Rally levels may not pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage their dog. Loud or harsh commands or intimidating signals will be penalized.
4. There should be a sense of teamwork between the handler and the dog.
5. Times will be recorded, but not posted. Times will only be used to break ties.
6. All 4-H Rally classes will be patterned after the latest AKC guidelines whenever possible, except that dog registry with AKC is not required. Some exercises and rules may have been adapted from AKC to better serve the youth of this program.

7. In all Rally classes a non-qualifying (NQ) score will be administered for the following: strong correcting, disciplining, fouling the ring, excessive barking, consistently tight lead, knocking over a jump, or a sign not attempted by a handler.
8. Scoresheets can be viewed on the Colorado 4-H website <http://co4h.colostate.edu/program-areas/state-fair-information/contest-score-sheets/>
9. There are no Rally classes for Veteran dogs. All dogs must be able to jump required heights and perform the required items.
10. The required jump heights for Rally classes are as follows:

RALLY NOVICE DIVISION

There will be no Rally Novice A class offered this year.

CLASS #30: Rally Novice B

This class is for handlers in their second year or higher of Rally Novice training with the same dog used in the Rally Novice A class who have not yet earned a qualifying score in Rally Novice at Fair, OR for handlers who are starting a new dog that has never competed in Rally. Participants are allowed to compete in this class until they have obtained a qualifying score in Rally Novice at Fair or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association. All exercises are judged on leash, and all dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

RALLY INTERMEDIATE DIVISION

CLASS #31: Rally Intermediate A

This class is for experienced handlers in their first year of Rally Intermediate training who have not received a qualifying score in Intermediate Rally at any State 4-H Dog Trial or received an equivalent title from any national dog association. A handler may only compete in Rally Intermediate A for one year. All exercises are judged on leash, and all dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The leash must be made of fabric or leather and needs to be long enough to provide adequate slack. Only the same collars allowed for Obedience are allowed for Rally. There are no jumps in this class.

CLASS #32: Rally Intermediate B

This class is for any handler who is in their second year or above of Rally Intermediate training with the same dog used in the Rally Intermediate A Class who has not yet earned a qualifying score Rally Intermediate at Fair or who is starting a dog that has never competed in Rally. Handlers are allowed to compete in this class until they have obtained a qualifying score or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association. All exercises are judged on leash, and all dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. There are no jumps in this class.

RALLY ADVANCED DIVISION

CLASS #33: Rally Advanced A

Rally Advanced A is for experienced handlers in their first year of Rally Advanced training who have not received a qualifying score in Advanced Rally at **Fair**, or an equivalent title from any national dog association. ****NOTE****Beginning in 2018, all exercises in the 4-H Rally Advanced level will be performed off leash. Therefore, any participant who received a qualifying score in 4-H Rally Advanced A at a County or State Fair prior to 2018 may repeat the Advanced A level class. A handler may only compete in Rally Advanced A class for one year. All exercises are judged off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Advanced Rally course may include one jump.

CLASS #34: Rally Advanced B

This class is for experienced handlers in their second or higher year of Rally Advanced training **who have not yet earned a qualifying score in Rally Advanced at Fair**. Handlers may compete in this class until they have obtained a qualifying score, or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association. ****NOTE****Beginning in 2018, all exercises in the 4-H Rally Advanced level will be performed off leash. Therefore, any handler who received a qualifying score in 4-H Rally Advanced B at a County or State Fair prior to 2018 may repeat the Advanced A level class. All exercises are judged off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Advanced Rally course may include one jump.

RALLY EXCELLENT DIVISION

CLASS #35: Rally Excellent A

Rally Excellent A Class is for experienced handlers who are in their first year of Rally Excellent training who have not received a qualifying score in Rally Excellent at **Fair** or received an equivalent title from any national dog association. A handler may only compete in the A class for one year. All exercises are judged off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Excellent Rally course may include two jumps. Unlike the Rally Novice and Advanced Classes, in Rally Excellent handlers are not allowed to pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage the dog. Verbal encouragement, multiple commands, and/or inaudible signals using one or both arms and hands are allowed; the handler's arms need not be maintained in any particular position at any time. Handlers may not touch their dog or make any physical corrections.

CLASS #36: Rally Excellent B

This class is for experienced handlers in their second year or above of Rally Excellent training **who have not yet earned a qualifying score in Rally Excellent**. Handlers are allowed to compete in this class until they have obtained a qualifying score at **Fair**, or the dog being shown has received an equivalent title from a national dog association. All exercises are judged off leash. All dogs must enter and leave the ring on leash. The Excellent Rally course may include two jumps. Unlike the Rally Novice and Advanced Classes, in Rally Excellent handlers are not allowed to pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage the dog. Verbal encouragement, multiple commands, and/or inaudible signals using one

or both arms and hands are allowed; the handler's arms need not be maintained in any particular position at any time. Handlers may not touch their dog or make any physical corrections.

RALLY RAE DIVISION

CLASS #37: Rally Advanced/Excellent A (RAE-A)

The Rally Advanced/Excellent A Class is for experienced handlers who are in their first year of RAE training who have not received a qualifying score in RAE at Fair, or have not received an equivalent title for any national dog association. A handler may only compete in the A class for one year. All exercises are judged off leash. Handlers must receive a qualifying score in BOTH the Rally Advanced course and the Rally Excellent course at the same dog trial in order to receive a qualifying score in RAE.

CLASS #38: Rally Advanced/Excellent B (RAE-B)

The Rally Advanced/Excellent B class is for handlers in their second year or above of RAE training and who have not yet earned a qualifying score in Rally Advanced Excellent at Fair. All exercises are judged off leash. Handlers must receive a qualifying score in BOTH the Rally Advanced course and the Rally Excellent course at the same dog trial in order to receive a qualifying score in RAE. A handler may continue to compete in this class for the remainder of their 4-H years in the dog project unless they choose to advance to the Rally Masters level class.

RALLY MASTERS DIVISION

It is optional for a member to move up to the Masters level after receiving a qualifying score in Rally Advanced/Excellent. However, once the member and dog team has shown in Rally Masters at County Fair, that member/dog team is no longer eligible to compete in a lower level class.

CLASS 39: Masters Rally A & B

The Masters Rally A class is an optional class for any handler who has earned a qualifying score in Rally Advanced/Excellent at a previous County Fair. The Masters Rally B class is for experienced handlers in their 2nd year or above of Masters Rally training. Participants may continue to compete in the B class for their remaining years in the 4-H dog program regardless of whether they have received a qualifying score or received a Masters Rally title from a national dog association. All exercises are judged off leash and courses may have 2 jumps. Handlers are not allowed to pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage the dog. Verbal encouragement, multiple commands, and/or inaudible signals using one or both arms and hands are allowed; the handler's arms need not be maintained in any particular position at any time. Handlers may not touch their dog or make any physical corrections.

FUN CONTESTS

Virtual Costume Contest: This optional virtual contest will consist of dogs in costume. Costumes can include the handler and can be funny, serious, educational, etc. Contestants will upload a photo of their costume contest entry to Fair Entry. Entries will be judged based on creativity. **The deadline to upload photos to Fair Entry is August 3, 2020.**

Illegible tattoos or non-readable microchips must be replaced with a scrapies tag.
4. Dairy Goats entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Friday in April (April 24th) of the current year using the species Animal Identification Form and uploaded on 4-HOnline enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (April 24th). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of their project or is an official Lease-An-Animal 4-H project. The Animal Identification form does not replace the online entry of fair classes, however is in addition to the entry. The only

exception is for babies born after April 24, in which case the dam must have been owned by the exhibitor by April 24th. See Rule 4a.

a. For dairy and fiber animals born after April 24th, the member will need to provide a hard copy printed animal identification form with updates to the Extension office and FFA advisor as they are completed. All animals planned to be shown at the Boulder County Fair must have forms completed and turned in prior to July 10th. The members must own the dam as of April 24th, of the current year and listed as their project animal on the animal identification form provided by April 24th.

5. All animals must be disbudded or dehorned.

2. Exhibitors must be enrolled in the Market/Breeding project (Departments 550 or 525) to be eligible to participate in showmanship. Showmanship will proceed in the following age group order: Juniors, Intermediates, Seniors.
3. Bracing is not allowed in breeding classes. When posing the goat all four feet must remain on the ground. (When touched / inspected by the judge, natural weight with all four feet must remain on the ground.)

ELIGIBILITY:

1. To be eligible to show in the Jr. Breeding Goat Show at the Boulder County Fair all exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Breeding Goat Project.
2. All animals must be healthy and pass general health inspection by a veterinarian or show staff.
3. All Jr. & Sr. breeding does must be owned by the exhibitor as of Jan 1st of the current year. All goats younger than Jan 1st of the current year must be bred and/or born and raised by the exhibitor, with the dam and birth listed in the breeding record.
4. Registered animals are not required; if goats are registered they must be solely in the exhibitor's name. All breeding goats AND all does and wethers 12 months and older must have a scrapies tag in an ear. All breeding goats will be identified by the number on their scrapies tag.
5. Non-market goats entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Friday in April of the current year using the Animal Identification form and uploaded on 4-HOnline enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (Last Friday in April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of

their 4-H project.

6. For meat type animals, in the breeding program, born after the last Friday in April of the current year, the member will need to provide a hard copy printed form the animal identification form with updates to the Extension office and FFA advisor as they are completed. All animals planned to be shown at the Boulder County Fair must have forms completed and turned in prior to the deadline. The members must own the dam as of January 1st of the current year and listed as their project animal on the animal identification form provided by the last Friday in April.
7. The Animal Identification form does not replace the online entry of fair classes, however, is in addition to the entry.
8. Meat type does may be identified as market animals and/or breeding animals at the initial tag in/Animal Identification form process. However, when the animal is entered into fair they may be shown in either a market or breeding class, but not both.
9. Absolutely NO BUCKS allowed on premises.

CLASSIFICATION:

1. All classes are judged by age of goat as of the date of show.
2. All breeding classes will either be in person on the fairgrounds or virtual format. Exhibitors may choose, by July 27th, to either enter all of their classes virtually OR show in person.
3. Both face-to-face and virtual format will be judged at the time of the in-person show and will be judged together as one class. For example, the pre-junior doe class will be combined between the face-to-face and virtual entries and be judged as one class. The judge will be shown the virtual entries during the live show and place those entries accordingly.
4. All fitting and showing will closely follow breed standards:

4. Exhibitors are required to wear closed leather shoes/boots; a white shirt; and black pants in the show ring **and in the videos**. (White button up/Polo shirt)
5. Barn A will be closed daily, to the public **and exhibitors**, from 9:30 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. This for the safety and welfare of livestock and exhibitors while at the fair.

Rules: Simple Goat Show at Blue Goat Farm.

1. Families will have scheduled arrival times so that there are no groups in parking area or getting goats. **No more than 10 people allowed in or around show area at any time so this should only be exhibitors and show staff. ALL other family members must be inside their vehicles while on the premises.** Once goat is caught & tied in family area, exhibitors will need to wait in vehicles until class is called to maintain the 10 people limit.
2. Masks must be worn by everyone on the farm outside of vehicles at all times. Families may be in groups but all others must maintain at least 6' or more apart at all times. Please avoid touching/leaning/sitting on common fixed surfaces (fencing, water faucets, etc) without gloves or sanitizing the surface first.
3. Each Family will have a 12'X12' area that will be marked by pin flags, prior to their arrival.

Families are to bring their own chairs, water, etc. All equipment needed for the goat show will be placed in the family spot, no 4-H members will be allowed in the barn. 4-H members will get their goat from the goat pen and will move it to the family area to prepare for show.

4. If handling shared equipment, participants will wear disposable gloves. Each gate will be assigned with a person to open & close the gate to prevent additional contact.
5. A hand washing station will be set up for participants to use. Participants will supply their own hand sanitizer
6. Exhibitors are required to wear closed leather shoes/boots; a white shirt; and black pants in the show ring and in entry videos. (White button up/Polo shirt)

ELIGIBILITY:

1. To be eligible to show in the Jr. Fiber Goat Show at the Boulder County Fair all exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H Fiber Goat Project. Only the exhibitor may handle goats for the fair entry photos and video.
2. Fiber goats entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Friday of April (April 24th) of the current year using the Animal Identification form and uploaded on 4-HOnline enrollment or through their FFA advisor. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadlines each year (Last Friday of April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership of the animal and are providing primary care of their 4-H project or is an official Lease-An-Animal 4-H project.
 - a. For fiber animals born after April 24th, the member will need to provide a hard copy printed animal identification form with updates to the Extension office and FFA advisor as they are completed. All animals planned to be shown at the Boulder County Fair must have forms completed and turned in prior to July 10th. The members must own the dam as of the last Friday in April, of the current year and listed as their project animal on the animal identification form provided by April 24th.

1. All hogs must be inspected by fair veterinarian and superintendent during Swine Weigh-In.
3. All swine exhibited at the Boulder County Fair must originate in herds known not to be infected with pseudo rabies.

5. Barns will be closed to all Public. Access only allowed for Swine Exhibitor and 1 adult helper per family. NO EXCEPTIONS. There will be no stalling.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. To be eligible to show in the Jr. Breeding Swine Show at the Boulder County Fair all exhibitors must be enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Breeding Swine Project.
2. **Gilts that have been shown in breeding classes may be shown in market classes if a 4-H breeding and market record book has been completed by the exhibitor AND the exhibitor is enrolled in the Swine Breeding and Market Projects**
3. Weigh Classification (breeding gilts only) - Minimum Weight 166lbs - Maximum Weight 325 (Note: this Includes the 5% weight variance due to the date changes of the shows.)

CLASSIFICATION: Breed characteristics are listed below, however classifier will default to the National Swine Registry Breed Characteristics and the Certified Pedigreed Swine association as well as specific breed registries not listed on one of the two previous websites.

Breed Marking Requirements for Breeding Gilts are as follows:

Duroc

1. Color marking shall be red.
2. Ears must be down and medium size.
3. Must not have any white hair located on the animal.
4. No more than three black spots, none over two inches in diameter on the body.
5. Must not have any shading or indication of a belt.
6. Must not have any black hair.

Hampshire

1. Must be black in color with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body. Animal is eligible if it has a black head and the body is totally white.
2. Ears must be erect and not rounded
3. Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
4. Must NOT have any red hair.

Yorkshire

1. Must be white in color and ears must be erect.
2. Must not have any colored hair other than white.
3. Must NOT have more than two pigmentation spots larger than a U.S. minted dime or one pigmentation spot larger than a U.S. minted quarter.
4. Must not have any skin pigmentation when combined is larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.

Chester White-

1. Must be solid white in color and no other color on the skin larger than a silver dollar.
2. Ears must be down and medium size.
3. Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

Berkshire

1. Must be black and white with erect ears.
2. Must have white on all four legs, face and tail.
3. Must not have solid white or solid black face from the ears forward.
4. Must not have a solid black nose.
5. White is allowed on the ears but no solid white may appear on the ears.
6. Berkshire must NOT have an area of white skin that exceeds 93.5 Square inches of contiguous solid white skin on the upper 2/3 of the body.
7. No white skin or hair that encircles the body between the base of the ear and base of the tail.

Spotted Swine

1. Must be black and white in color.
2. Ears must be down and reasonably sized.
3. Red or sandy brown spots are not allowed.
4. No solid black head from the ears forward.
5. Must not have any shading or indication of a belt.
6. No white belt pattern (hair or skin) that encompasses the back 1/3 of both shoulder blades and extends down to the foreleg of the animal. The belt pattern is not completely broken by black. Exception to this rule is a predominately white-bodied individual with a white face.-

Landrace

1. Must be white in color with no other color on the body.
2. Ears must be down.
3. Must not have any more than three spots of skin pigmentation any of them larger than one U.S. minted quarter.

Hereford

1. Must be White Faced (at least 50%)
2. Must have down (At least broke Forward) ears.
2. Not less than two-thirds red exclusive of face and ears.
3. At least 2 white feet not showing less than 1 inch above the hoof.
4. Must be red (light or dark) in color. No white belt or partial belt.
5. No swirls

Tammworth

1. Must be Dark or golden red in color with erect ears.
2. Elongated snout.
3. No Swirls

Poland China

1. Must be Black with 6 white points (Face, Feet, and Tail).
2. Must not have more than one black leg
3. Ears must be down

4. Must not have evidence of a white belt or partial belt formation.
5. Cannot have red or sandy hair or pigment
6. Occasional splash of white on body is permissible.

PREMIUMS:

Premium prize money will be awarded based on placements in each market swine class or breeding swine class. Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.

GENERAL:

1. **All hogs must be inspected by fair veterinarian and superintendent during Swine Weigh-In.**
2. All swine exhibited at the Boulder County Fair must originate in herds known not to be infected with pseudo rabies.
3. The USDA Wholesome Meat Act form and Livestock Sale Intent form are to be signed by exhibitor & parent by July 27th electronically this year. Please see sale rules for other specifics for participation this year.
4. Hogs will be required to be clean and free of foreign materials during the weigh-in. Hogs that are dirty will need to be washed off with water prior to weigh in and are allowed to use the wash racks giving ample time before the end of weigh-in. It is requested that all hogs be washed off with water prior to weigh in. Hogs are not allowed to leave the wash rack before being weighed in. **No re-weighs will be allowed after the hog leaves the scale area.**
5. ONLY 4-H/FFA exhibitors, 1 adult helper per family and their animals may be in Barn B or wash rack area. All others must remain in their vehicle. No Exceptions.
6. Hogs will be shown by breed & by weight. No exhibitor may have more than two entries in any one weight/breed class.
7. Barns will be closed to all Public. Access only allowed for Swine Exhibitor and 1 adult helper per family. NO EXCEPTIONS!

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only members with a current Meat Quality Assurance certification (MQA) and enrolled in the 4-H or FFA Market Swine Project are eligible to enter Market Swine classes. Members showing at the Colorado State Fair are required to meet Pork Quality Assurance (PQA) requirements.
2. All market swine to be farrowed after January 1, 2020 and will be judged for form and finish.
3. Market pigs that are classified as Minimum Weight will enter the Feeder class, and are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Market Event.
4. Market pigs that are classified as Over Weight, will enter the Over weight class and are not eligible for the Jr. Livestock Market Event
5. All barrows must be castrated and completely healed from castration prior to animal identification day in May.

MARKET SWINE CLASSES

GENERAL:

1. All birds coming on the grounds must pass the required animal health inspection and be checked in.
2. Chicken meat birds and turkeys will be weighed after check-in
3. **Please be sure your birds are healthy, clean, and vermin free before check in. Close examination and dusting, if necessary, for lice and mites 7 and 2 days before check-in is suggested. Any bird determined to have LICE, MITES OR THEIR EGGS or to show symptoms of disease will be required to leave immediately and will not be able to show at fair.**
4. **The Exhibit Building will be closed for judging and to the public due to meeting the social distancing numbers.**
5. All eggs laid during the Fair will be collected daily by someone and put on display. At the end of each day the eggs will be composted.
6. **Exhibitors will supply their own feed and containers for feed and water.** No Styrofoam, paper cups, or glass containers are allowed. Feed and water containers must be secured to the cages to prevent spillage. Turkeys require gallon size water containers.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in a 4-H or FFA Fowl project (Market/Breeding Poultry, Market/Breeding Turkey, Show Birds, Duck, Goose, Pigeon and Game Birds) are eligible to enter Junior Poultry classes (Department 800).
2. The exhibitor must own all birds entered in this department by **May 1st** of the current year, **except for meat chicken pens.**
3. **There will be a Poultry ID clinic available for you to attend. It is highly encouraged for all first year members to attend!** At that time you may bring a list of your birds to get leg bands. Birds are

not required. You may bring any birds you have questions about, especially if you have birds that you are uncertain about in regards of breed or sex. **Contact Extension Office or Poultry Superintendent for date and time.**

CLASSIFICATION:

1. Cock and hen are birds over a year old at the time of show. Cockerel and pullet are birds less than a year at the time of show.
2. There will be no dual entry of birds in market vs breed classes. Exhibitors must choose one class.
3. Exhibitors are responsible for properly entering birds in the correct class. If showing chickens, be sure to verify whether you have bantam or standard size birds and enter in the appropriate class. There is a copy of the APA Standard of Perfection in the Extension Office to help correctly classify birds or ask the superintendents, who also have copies of the standards, before making your entry.
4. If there are more than 8 birds entered in any class of the Any Other Breed category in each of the major Classes (for example the Asiatic Breed), the class will be divided into additional breeds as required. There must be a minimum of 4 birds of any one breed in the class for that breed to be separated into a new category. The superintendent will decide this action.
5. **Young birds entered in breed classes should be at least four months old by the time of fair, so they have matured enough to be judged properly.**

JUDGING:

1. Most birds will be judged virtually this year due to limitations on in person programming.
2. Meat pens and market turkeys will be weighed by the superintendents and handled by the judge.
3. Egg production will be judged in person in the cages with the judge handling them.
4. An exhibitor is limited to not more than **TWO entries in any class** and may enter a maximum of **20 entries (excluding showmanship)** in the fair. **Production pens may also have TWO entries per class.** If birds are lost or die after they are entered, other birds of the same class may be substituted if the superintendent is advised before the show that this is necessary. If the number of birds an exhibitor is bringing to fair changes from what is on the entry form, contact the superintendent as soon as possible.
5. Breed classes are judged according to the APA Standard of Perfection. All birds entered in breed classes will be shown individually. Factors that are considered in judging are the following:
 - a. **Conformation** - bird must have proper shape, comb, etc., and be free of disqualifying defects.
 - b. **Color** - must have proper color pattern for variety and not have color defects such as wrong bill or leg color.
 - c. **Condition** - bird must be clean, healthy, have good feather quality, and be prepared for show.
6. Production Classes are judged on the following criteria:
 - a. For pullets in egg production pens, indication of early sexual maturity; for hens, records of laying at a high rate. Choose breeds that are known for laying large numbers of eggs. Laying hens one year old or older are not required to be in good feather condition.
 - b. Birds in chicken meat classes must be as uniform in weight as possible.
 - c. All meat production birds shall exhibit good growth rate
 - d. Condition - health, vigor, cleanliness and good feather quality.
 - e. Freedom from deformities.
 - f. Preparation of bird for showing.
 - g. Development and conformation of producing bird.

7. Non-Standard Fowl classes will include crossbred birds and purebred stock that do not meet breed descriptions of the standard of perfection. These birds may have non-standard leg color, combs, plumage color, etc. These birds will compete for Champion Non-Standard Fowl. Birds entered in production pens may NOT be exhibited individually in Non Standard Fowl classes. Production varieties such as California White, Red Star, and Black Star chickens may be exhibited in the non-standard fowl division in the appropriate weight class; please specify the variety on the entry form. Non-standard birds will be judged on the following:
- Condition - health, vigor, cleanliness, and good feather quality.
 - Freedom from deformities.
 - Preparation for show.

MARKET POULTRY AND LIVESTOCK SALE:

- The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Chicken and Turkey Meat birds have gone through the Junior Livestock Sale for many years. The Livestock Sale Committee has granted 6 more spaces, for a total of 10 spaces, for youth that have market ready poultry to participate in the sale this year. These 6 spaces are reserved for youth that have no other animals going through the Livestock Sale.
- In the event there are more than 6 youth in this category, the Poultry Superintendent will choose which birds will be eligible by drawing random classes and with placement order. First, we will ask exhibitors who intends to sell. In the event there are more than 6 youth wanting to sell, the superintendent will pick who is eligible by placement order and then by randomly drawing classes Starting with 3rd place and then going to all 4th places, etc. Market ready birds can be a pen of three meat chickens or one meat turkey.
- All birds that will be sold at the livestock sale be will processed and donated to a local shelter, unless otherwise specified by the buyer. The Poultry Superintendent will determine the current fair market value of poultry. A small sales commission and the cost of the sale photographs will also be deducted from the bid amount.
- All market birds will need to be delivered to the processor the following Monday, August 10th.

PREMIUMS:

- Where there is no competition between exhibitors in any class, only one premium will be awarded. The judge and superintendent of the department will award such prize or prizes as the bird deserves.
- Birds will be judged according to merit. No bird deemed unworthy or disqualified will be awarded any premium money.
- See the chart below for the amounts of Premium Money to be awarded in the Poultry Division. **Failure to clean pens or care for livestock will result in forfeit of premium money.** Premium money will be awarded after release and barn cleanup. Champion and Reserve Champion Ribbons will be awarded for each division. Best and Reserve of Class will be awarded for each of the major classes such as American Class.

PRODUCTION CLASSES (In Person Classes 2020)

CHICKEN EGG PRODUCTION: Only exhibitors enrolled in the Egg Production project are eligible to enter classes 116-117.

Birds will be judged on laying potential; must be uniform in all respects.

GENERAL:

1. **No dogs are allowed in the cavy area.**
3. All cavies are subject to be vet observed before being allowed in cavy area and cages. There is no charge for health inspection.
4. Exhibitors must provide all supplies for their cavy(ies) *including cage and bedding*. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for their own cavy(ies) and/or equipment, and cleaning of their cages and surrounding areas daily. Exhibitors will be fined \$5.00 per cage for unclean areas upon conclusion of the fair.
5. No cavies less than 8 weeks of age are allowed at fair. Do not bring newborn cavies to the fair just to be with their sow.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Only exhibitors enrolled in a 4-H Cavy project are eligible to enter Junior Cavy classes (Department 975).
2. All cavies must be owned by the exhibitor on or before the Last Friday in April of the exhibiting year. In the case of cavies born after the last Friday in April, the kindling sow must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before the last Friday in April of the exhibiting year, and the kindling sows records must appear in the exhibitor's record book.
3. Cavies entered in the Boulder County Fair must have been previously identified by the last Friday of April (April 24, 2020) of the current year using the Animal Identification Form and uploaded on the 4-HOnline enrollment. This form must be on file at the Boulder County Extension Office by the posted deadline each year (last Friday in April). By submitting this form, the member is declaring they have ownership the animal and are providing primary care of the 4-H project animal(s). If the project animal should die between the last Friday in April and before the Boulder County Fair, contact the superintendent for guidelines.
4. Cavies cannot be brought in and sold unless entered and shown in the respective class.

CLASSIFICATION:

1. **This is not an ARBA sanctioned show, but will be judged to ARBA standards at judges' discretion.**
2. Order of judging class will be determined by judge and posted near the judging table.
3. At the decision of the Superintendents, like classes (breeds) will be combined for judging, making

comparable size classes. Order of the judging will be posted near the judging tables.

REGULATIONS:

1. Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 5 cavy.
2. **Each Exhibitor is allowed 3 entries per class.**
3. **Exhibitors are allowed 2 entries per class in the fur class.**
4. After check-in and vet check, cavy must remain in the cavy area of Barn A until cleared for checkout on the final day. All cages and area must be clean before obtaining an initialized release slip from the Superintendents at the show ring before they can leave the building. Exhibitors found leaving early with their cavy will have all premiums withheld and run the risk of not being allowed to show the following year. We will not be held responsible for any cavy left after check-out. (In the event an exhibitor sells a cavy, the same rules apply to the new owner, and the exhibitor will be held responsible).

PREMIUMS:

Premiums will be paid by check and/or cash and will either be available for pick up or mailed out after the Fair. Superintendents have the right to use their discretion to hold or refuse prize money.
